CREATIVE COMMONS



A Creative Commons (CC) license is one of several public copyright licenses that enable the free distribution of an otherwise copyrighted work. A CC license is used when an author wants to give people the right to share, use, and build upon a work that they have created.

Six Types of CC Licenses

- **Attribution CC BY**
This license lets others distribute, remix, tweak, and build upon your work, even commercially, as long as they credit you for the original creation.
- **Attribution-ShareAlike CC BY-SA**
This license lets others remix, tweak, and build upon your work even for commercial purposes, as long as they credit you and license their new creations under the identical terms.
- **Attribution-NoDerivs CC BY-ND**
This license allows for redistribution, commercial and non-commercial, as long as it is passed along unchanged and in whole, with credit to you.
- **Attribution-NonCommercial CC BY-NC**
This license lets others remix, tweak, and build upon your work non-commercially, and although their new works must also acknowledge you and be non-commercial, they don't have to license their derivative works on the same terms.
- **Attribution-NonCommercial-ShareAlike CC BY-NC-SA**
This license lets others remix, tweak, and build upon your work non-commercially, as long as they credit you and license their new creations under the identical terms.
- **Attribution-NonCommercial-NoDerivs CC BY-NC-ND**
This license is the most restrictive of our six main licenses, only allowing others to download your works and share them with others as long as they credit you, but they can't change them in any way or use them commercially.

When giving an attribution it should look similar to this:

PUBLIC DOMAIN



Public Domain is works that are no longer in copyright term or were never protected by copyright law.

Royalty-free, or RF, refers to the right to use copyright material or intellectual property without the need to pay royalties or license fees for each use or per volume sold, or some time period of use or sales. The "free" in royalty-free does not mean there is no cost for the license.

Open Educational Resources

Open educational resources are materials for teaching or learning that are either in the public domain or have been released under a license that allows them to be freely used, changed, or shared with others.

Examples of OER resources



Khan Academy offers practice exercises, instructional videos, and a personalized learning dashboard that empower learners to study at their own pace in and outside of the classroom. They tackle math, science, computer programming, history, art history, economics, and more. Their math missions guide learners from kindergarten to calculus using state-of-the-art, adaptive technology that identifies strengths and learning gaps. They also partnered with institutions like NASA, The Museum of Modern Art, The California Academy of Sciences, and MIT to offer specialized content.

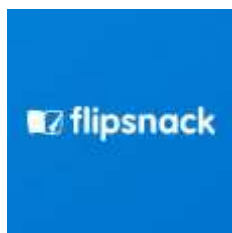
Biteable is a web-based tool that allows you to create beautiful explainer videos that you can easily add to your classroom to share with your students and make your lessons more interesting and engaging.
